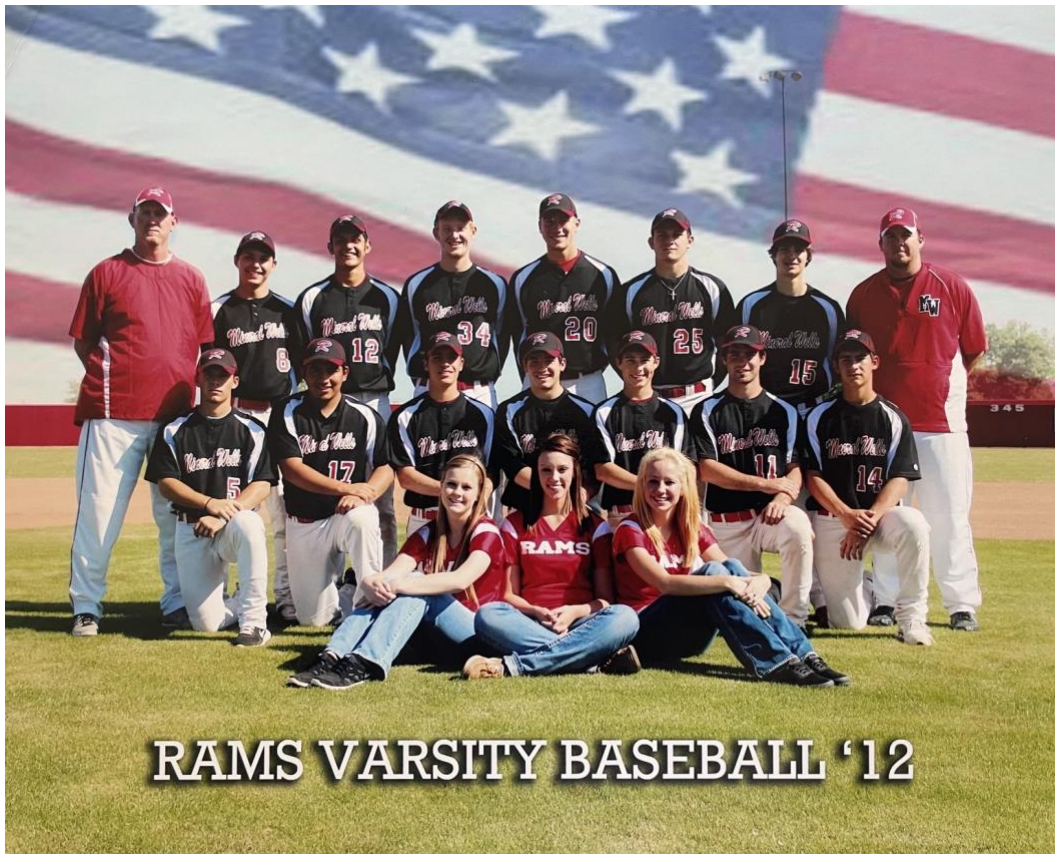
1959 Mountaineer Football Team

One of the most celebrated squads in school history, the 1959 Mountaineers finished 8-2, with losses only to eventual state champions Breckenridge and Brownwood. Powered by ten two-way senior starters, the team scored 30 or more points in six games and delivered memorable victories over Weatherford, Waxahachie, Grand Prairie, Stephenville, Graham, and Vernon.

2012 Ram Baseball Team



The 2012 Rams captured the District 7-3A championship and made one of the deepest playoff runs in school history, advancing to the regional semifinals with a 22-10 record. After an 8-8 start, the team surged to win 14 consecutive games and became the second of three straight district championship teams.

Craig Holamon



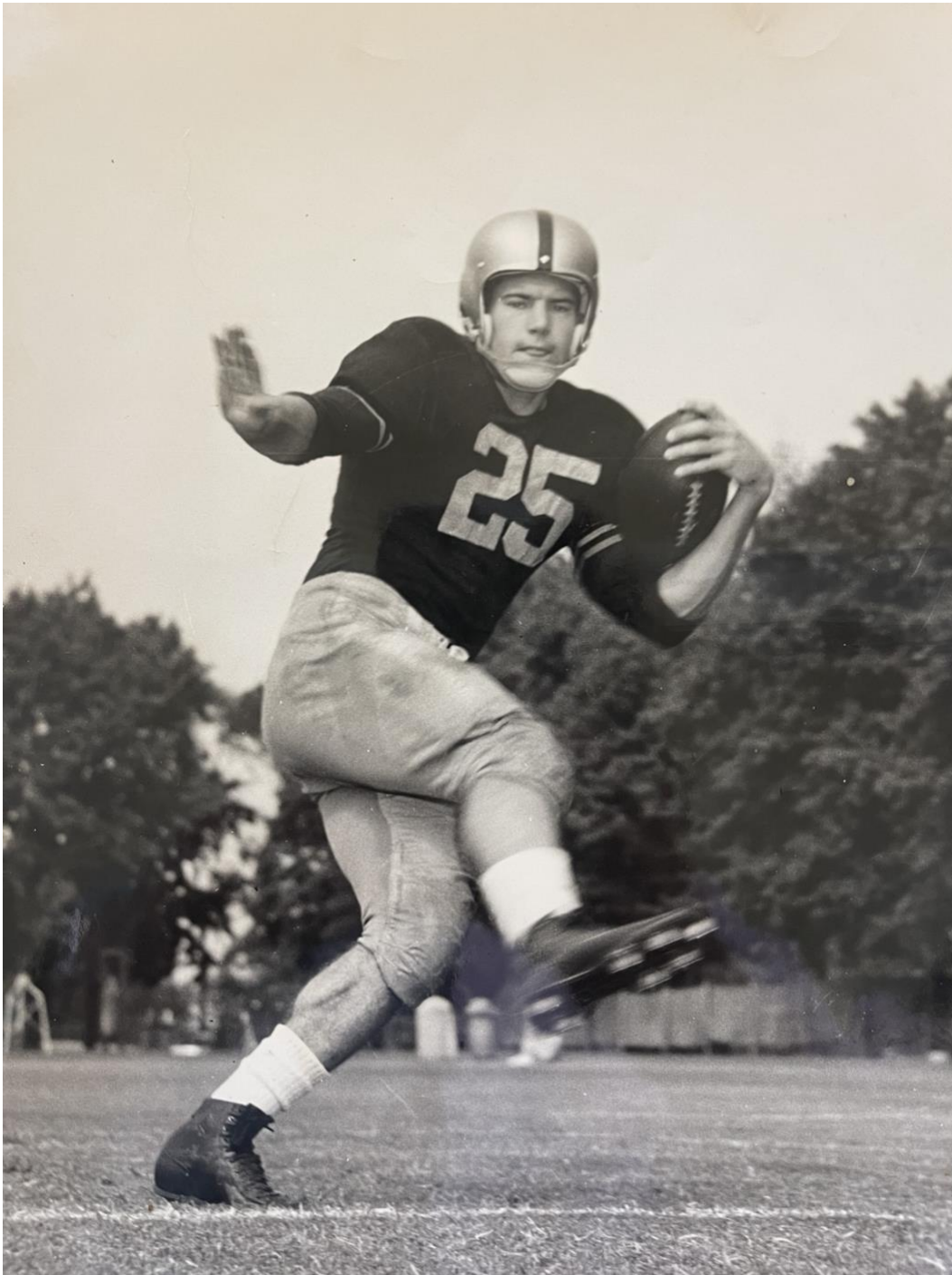

Rascellis Williams



A standout three-sport athlete, Williams became the 2015 Texas state champion in the high jump and set the Mineral Wells school record at 6'8". He later earned multiple All-American honors at Tarleton State University.

A 1953 graduate of Mineral Wells High School, Munger starred in football, basketball, and track, winning the 1953 Texas state title in the 220-yard dash. He later played football for Army and retired as a U.S. Army Lieutenant Colonel.
